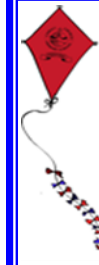

Emotional: Making things up about someone that is not true. Spreading rumours

Physical: punching, kicking, spitting, pinching and biting.

Cyber: Horrible text messages and emails, nasty things said and done on the internet

Verbal: Saying unkind things, name calling teasing, swearing.

- Religion or belief.
- Sexist bullying.
- Homophobic, biphobic, or transphobic bullying.

- Where someone lives.
