Barriers to Future Attainment (for pupils eligible for PP)

- Attainment on entry is well below in all areas of the Early Years curriculum. This includes a low level of basic skills including toileting and an inability to interact socially with other children and adults. Concentration, listening and language use and acquisition are also barriers. In later years these have an impact upon reading, writing and mathematics standards.
- > Attendance and punctuality is slightly lower for our PP pupils.
- > A number of our PP pupils have social, emotional and behavioural difficulties.
